

Navigating Perpetual Mental Health Issues in a Pandemic

John Westefeld, professor emeritus of counseling psychology Friday, January 7, 1:00 p.m., via Zoom

How do we keep going when the pandemic keeps hanging around and creating strain in our lives? This presentation will focus on some of the psychological challenges from the pandemic and how to manage them.



Professor Westefeld is a board-certified psychologist whose primary professional interests during his 42-year professional career—including 25 years at the University of Iowa—have ben suicide/suicide prevention and educating the public about mental health issues. He retired in 2016 as an emeritus professor and then worked until 2020 in private practice. He recently received the 2021 Distinguished Faculty Award from the UI.

Her academic research focuses on media, African Americans, and popular culture.

How Techologies Are Changing the Way We Think

Professor Hourcade will discuss some of the ways that interactive technologies can optimally impact our cognitive processes.

Reminder: Photo Contest Deadline Is January 31

Contest Details

Deadline: January 31, 2022

Entry Fee: None

Photo Categories: There are three categories of travel photos, all locational:

- Iowa—photos taken in the state of Iowa
- United States—photos taken in the U.S. but outside Iowa
- International—photos taken outside of the U.S.

Call for Nominations: Volunteer Service Awards

Each year two UIRA members are honored for their volunteer service post-retirement. The **Community Service Award** honors a member for service to the community at large; the **University Service Award** honors a member for service to the university. Volunteer service may include a wide range of activities that make a positive impact. The criteria for the award are:

- A nominee must be a member of UIRA.
- A nominee must have been retired for a period of at least two years.
- The awards are based on outstanding service carried out since retirement. Activities prior to retirement are not considered.
- Recipients are expected to be present at the annual meeting to accept the award.

Any UIRA member may submit a nomination, including nominating themselves. Nominations should include a one-page letter describing how the nominee has successfully contributed through their involvement in one or more activities, and a one-page biography of the nominee which includes the nominee's name, address, email address, and phone number. **Nominations are due February 15, 2022.** Submit nominations to Awards Committee Chair Lucille Heitman at lheitman7@gmail.com.
