

<u>Directions via Highway 1</u>: take Highway 1 toward Solon and turn left onto Newport Rd., follow Newport Rd. about 1 mile to Sugar Bottom Rd. NE and turn right onto Sugar Bottom Rd. NE. Follow Sugar Bottom Rd. NE for about 2 miles, then turn left onto 245th St. NE. Cangleska Wakan will be on the left.

UIRA Board Member Candidates

UIRA elects 3-4 new board members each year. The candidates this year are President-Elect Deborah Cobb and Board members **Mike Hovland** (three-year term), **Maureen McCormick** (two-year term), and **Evalyn Van Allen-Shalash** (three-year term). Ballots will be sent out in early May.

Deborah Cobb received her DDS in 1982 and her MS in 1995 from the University of Iowa. She was in private practice in Palo Alto, Calif., before returning to Iowa to join the Operative Department in 1993. She served as the director of the pre-doctoral third-year Operative Clinic and didactic course. Her clinical research was focused on adhesive dental materials. In 2003 she became director of the Operative Dentistry Graduate Program and retired in 2015. She is serving her second term on Emeritus Faculty Council. Deb enjoys biking, fishing, hiking, and spending time with her children and grandchildren, who live in Colorado.

Mike Hovland was hired by the University of Iowa in September 2014 to create an office of data enrollment management data analytics, which he led until his retirement on June 30, 2021. During his seven years as director, he helped to develop a comprehensive suite of analytic and predictive data tools and resources, which led to more cost-effective recruiting with better results and provided a variety of benefits to offices and departments across campus. In 2020 he received one of the Board of Regents Staff Excellence Awards. He received his PhD in English from the University of Iowa

in 1987. He continues as an active musician and singer, and he and his wife are selfdescribed musical tourists, seeking frequent opportunities to hear concerts in the US and abroad, including a recent performance of Brahms Requiem in Reykjavik in March 2022. He is also an avid biker with many RAGBRAIs dating back to 1975. Finally, he is writing a family history of his immigrant ancestors and their descendants.

Maureen McCormick received her BFA from the University of Northern Iowa and her MA from the University of Iowa. After a year of teaching elementary art, she took a position at UI News Services working almost 40 years at the university. Her most recent positions included being director of Staff Development and Training, where she brought online learning opportunities to UI staff, faculty, and students, and as communications director for Distance and Online Education. McCormick retired in January 2020, taking a position briefly with Kirkwood Regional Center before the pandemic hit. Since then, she's been downsizing, organizing, and repurposing stuff in her home, and finally getting time to make art.

Small Windows

My first memory is of mountains. Standing on my mother's lap, I see them out the small window of the airliner. They are crinkled like an old person's skin, in colors of gray and black, with white snow on top. My aunt is sick. She holds a paper bag over her mouth and throws up quietly, hardly making a sound. She is a big woman with big hair.

The second memory is of my mother telling me the reason I'm so sleepy is that time is different here in California, and I don't know what that means, but I get to put on my jammies in the middle of the day and sleep in a room bright with sun, in a bunkbed tall as the ceiling.

Then I am in grass over my head, seeing nothing but stems and sky and the heads and shoulders of my cousins up ahead, chasing a balsawood glider, mashing down the trail I follow, trying to keep up.

Then I am at Disneyland, walking between my mother and aunt down a long broad street toward a tall silver rocket with a red nose and red fins. A door at the bottom opens to pitch darkness. My mom and I sit in soft seats in a circle with other people, looking up at stars and the moon drifting across the ceiling.

Years later, I told my mother I still remembered these four moments from our trip to Disneyland. I can't have been more than four, I said. You were only two, she said. I don't know how it's possible to hold memories that long, but I can understand why those four things impressed me so. I can hear my mother saying, "Look, Joe. Mountains," in a way that made them sound fantastic and important. I can hear her saying, "Floy is feeling sick," in a way that made me feel concerned. Bedtime at midday and my first sight of bunk beds. Cousins like giants in the grass, and a tall rocket with nighttime and the moon inside.

There comes a time with early memories when you no longer recall the moment, so much as recollect remembering it. Sometimes, I could check with Mom, but then she came down with Alzheimer's and her memory began to fail. Then her voice could no longer tell me whether she remembered or not. Then she forgot it all. But this small part of it is now yours.
