**Overview of the UI's 10-Year Facilities Master Plan**

The UI's 10-year facilities master plan will create much-needed academic space at the core of campus and modernize the delivery of education and patient care to Iowans. Projects included in the master plan, which will evolve and change, will be paid for with a mix of donor funding, state funding, hospital revenue, and other sources. Attendees will learn about specific new buildings planned, updates to current facilities, and more.

Since 2014, **Rod Lehnertz** has served as the UI senior vice president for Finance and Operations, with responsibility for most non-academic operations of the university. Additionally, he represents the institution as its university architect. Previously, Lehnertz was the director of Planning, Design and Construction in Facilities Management. His responsibilities included campus master planning, capital project management, and campus space management.

Music and the largest student organization on campus, we bring all Hawkeyes together to Fight for Iowa. Comprised of students from nearly every major within the university, this time-honored organization combines quality musicianship, Hawkeye spirit, pride, and dedication to create their nationally renowned gridiron excitement.

**Dr. Eric W. Bush** is associate director of bands and director of the Hawkeye Marching Band in the School of Music. He leads the athletic band program, conducts the Iowa Concert Band, and teaches, including marching band techniques and band arranging. Under his direction,

#### **Creating a More Resilient Community Food System** in Johnson County

In the past, many Iowans grew their own food but today most land is farmed for corn and soybeans—animal feed and ethanol. It is estimated that up to 90% of the food we eat is imported from out of state while many people have little access to fresh fruit and vegetables. Field to Family (F2F)

is a local nonprofit organization with a mission to create a more resilient, local, and healthy community food system. Its leadership and programs allow for Iowa-grown food to be enjoyed by families, served at schools, colleges, and universities, and to be donated to food banks and school backpack programs.

Michelle Kenyon is the executive director of F2F. Michelle has previously served as a member and chair of the Johnson County Food Policy Council from 2012 to 2020, a food and agricultural advisory board to the Johnson County Board of Supervisors. She has more than 20 years of experience in nonprofit management, working to increase environmental health through renewable energy, food system education, sustainable agriculture promotion, and local foods.

### Why Do Babies Sleep Like Babies?

Blumberg will discuss some of the big questions about sleep in developing animals, including humans, and the ways that researchers in his lab are trying to answer them. He'll plan to provide answers to questions we may have about sleep across the lifespan. In addi-

tion, he will share information about other research going on in the Department of Psychological and Brain Sciences.

Mark Blumberg is the F. Wendell Miller Professor and chair of the Department of Psychological and Brain Sciences at the university. Blumberg received a Ph.D. from the University of Chicago and postdoctoral training at Indiana University. He is a Fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science and the American Psychological Association, past-president of the International Society for Developmental Psychobiology, and former editor-in-chief of *Behavioral Neuroscience*.
