

Emeritus Faculty Council Lecture

A Dark, Unruly Space

Patricia Foster, Professor Emerita Department of English and Nonfiction Writing Program Thursday, October 5, 4:00 p.m. Kollros Auditorium (101 Biology Building East)

What happens when a mother and daughter with different political concerns discuss issues of race in America?

In 2015 on a visit home to Alabama, Patricia Foster and her mother argue over the riots in Ferguson, Mo. This encounter becomes the catalyst for Foster's visit to Africatown in Plateau, Ala. (40 miles from her hometown), where the last American slave ship, the Clotilda, arrived in 1860 after the U.S. had abolished the international slave trade in 1808.

What Foster discovers in Africatown disturbs and ignites her curiosity, leading her to two significant books—*Dreams of Africa in Alabama*, Sylviana A. Diouf (Oxford University Press) and *Barracoon*, Zora Neale Hurston (Amistad)—and to writing an essay "A Dark, Unruly Space" (Massachusetts Review, a Notable Essay in *The Best American Essays*) in which she explores the personal and historical aspects of this experience. This essay is a part of Foster's new book, *Written in the Sky: Lessons of a Southern Daughter*.



History of the Gray Hawk Writers

During the early years of the University of Iowa Retirees Association—known as the Gray Hawks—then President Sam Becker and board member Gordon Strayer requested a volunteer to organize a memoir writers group.

Sandra Hudson responded to the challenge. Based on her experiences as a member of the University Club Writers, the National League of American Pen Women, and several courses at the University of Iowa Summer Writing Festival, she drafted guidelines and an agenda. The greatest influence on Sandra's design was playwright Jeffrey Sweet. He was adamant that readings should be limited to 8 minutes to ensure better critiques, ward off boredom, and enable greater participation. That has worked well for nearly a quarter of a century.

The first meeting of the Grayhawk Writers occurred on April 14, 1999. It was a perfect day for new beginnings—sweater weather. An occasional cumulus cloud added interest to the blue skies and there was a soft, soothing, east-southeast breeze. John Hudson chaired that meeting and by popular acclamation continued to do so for the next 20 years.

Our writing has expanded beyond memoirs to include personal essays, delicious limericks, academic papers for a lay audience, travel logs, thought-provoking poetry, fiction, historical fiction, lectures, PowerPoint presentations, social critiques, and newsletters. In short, whatever takes a writer's fancy.

Our group meets fortnightly. We have limited our membership to 14 to allow time for everyone to read at each meeting. Frequently, there has been more interest than our group could accommodate, therefore, our members have helped to form additional writing groups beginning with Oaknoll in 2004.

A spouse declared our stories should be published in an anthology. We all agreed. The process was not quick. A couple of years passed before our book, Yesterdays, was displayed in the Iowa section of Prairie Lights bookstore in 2014.

Each of the 24 authors, or their executors, determined the stories for their section of Yesterdays. Alan Brody edited the book and the Hudson's did the typesetting, and book design for self-publishing. The proceeds of the book were donated to the Iowa City UNESCO City of Literature.

In 2019 John Hudson became chair emeritus. To inaugurate the third decade of the Gray Hawk Writers, Doug Paul was elected chair by acclamation. With the arrival of the Covid-19 pandemic in early 2020, our new chair was faced with a considerable challenge. Doug skillfully applied triage and arranged for us to meet via Zoom. Our group survived. No matter how or where we meet, our fortnightly gatherings have been treasured experiences, with the camaraderie of sharing our writing experiences and learning from one another. We have all become better writers.

It is our intention to publish a new anthology for our 25th anniversary. Our current membership includes Joe Artz, John Hudson, Sandra Hudson, David Jepsen, Judith Klink, Jeanne Liston, James O'Gorman, Doug Paul, Omer Sanan, Jane Shuttleworth, Judy Terry, Roger Williamson, and Deanne Wortman.
