

From UIRA President Deb Cobb A Celebration: UIRA Is in the UI Policy Manual

The UIRA Board of Directors is pleased to share with our members news of an exciting new chapter in our synergistic relationship with the University of Iowa.

President Barbara Wilson has confirmed that the UIRA is now included in the University of Iowa's *Policy Manual*, recognizing us as **an official advisory body to the university** on issues relating to the interests and welfare of retired faculty and staff.

This official inclusion solidifies the strong and productive relationship between the UIRA and the university built over many years, and it ensures future continuity in the support and recognition of the UIRA even as administrators and personnel change. We are grateful for the support of President Wilson and the shared-governing bodies of the university in bringing this formal affiliation to fruition.

This important milestone in UIRA history is a culmination of years of dedicated effort by past UIRA presidents, officers, and members. While there has always been a good relationship between the UIRA and the UI, the UIRA operated independently in the past with no formal relationship or financial support. In 2022, the UIRA leadership continued the work begun by past presidents and boards to establish a Memorandum of Understanding with the University of Iowa, which supported a part-time (25% FTE) administrative services coordinator. This was instrumental in enabling the UIRA to implement electronic dues collection, provide reliable communications technology, and update our website and email system. **The UIRA continues to support the UI by volunteering for activities dedicated to students and contributing to student scholarships, the Food Pantry, and other funds that support student success**.

As we look ahead, the future for the UIRA is bright and our relationship with the University of Iowa strong. As part of its mission, the UIRA offers its members many ways to stay connected with each other and the university through volunteer opportunities, informative programs, social events, and initiatives such as *The Gray Hawk* newsletter. As we enter this new phase in our history, the UIRA welcomes the input and participation of all our members toward building a stronger community.

As Hancher's director of programming and engagement, Aaron Greenwald oversees all programming presented by Hancher, including concerts and performances of every genre and variety, a robust Broadway season, and over 100 discreet annual engagements between visiting artists and students, faculty, and staff at the university.

Aaron Greenwald came to the university in October 2022. Previously, he served as managing director of the Big Ears Festival—described by *The New York Times* as "one of the world's greatest music bashes"—in Knoxville, Tenn. Before that, he was executive director of Duke Performances at Duke University (2006–2019). Prior to that, Greenwald helped conceive and produce the New Yorker Festival and the New York Comedy Festival. Straight out of college, he spent several years producing country music videos in Nashville including the iconic video for Kenny Chesney's iconic tune "She Thinks My Tractor's Sexy." Greenwald received a BA in theater from Columbia University and was awarded a postgraduate Fulbright to study theater post-Apartheid in South Africa.

All Things Water: Improving Community Resilience to Floods, Droughts, and Declining Water Quality

The State of Iowa recently completed a project entitled the Iowa Watershed Approach focused on improving community resilience to floods, droughts, and declining water quality. This science-based project followed a systematic process of hydrologic assessment, goal setting, development of watershed plans, installation of monitoring systems, project construction, community engagement, identification of vulnerable

populations, and details participant surveys and quantitative assessment. The



presentation will provide a vision for a more resilient Iowa across all sizes of cities, from small rural communities to large urban centers.

Larry Weber is the Edwin B. Green Chair in Hydraulics in the Department of Civil and Environmental Engineering and director of IIHR—Hydroscience and Engineering, the nation's oldest academic research program focused on hydraulics, hydrology, and fluid mechanics. He co-founded the Iowa Flood Center at the University of Iowa and the Iowa Nutrient Research Center in partnership with Iowa State University.

Emeritus Faculty Council Lecture

The Search for Race: Civil War Medicine and Science

Leslie uses the social and cultural history of Civil War medicine and science to probe the question of how and why anti-Black racism survived the destruction of slavery. Leslie's talk will describe how white Northerners—

the U.S. Sanitary Commission and Army medical personnel conducted wartime research aimed at proving Black medical and biological inferiority. She argues that this research not only led to the mistreatment of Black soldiers and civilians, it also promoted the notion of white authority about racial science and medicine.

Service Award Nominations Due April 15

Each year two UIRA members are honored for their volunteer service post-retirement. <u>The Community Service Award</u> honors a UIRA member for service to the community at large and the <u>Volunteer Service Award</u> honors a UIRA member for service to the university. The criteria for the awards are:

- A nominee must be a UIRA member and must have been retired for a period of at least two (2) years.
- The awards are based on outstanding service carried out since retirement. Activities prior to retirement are not considered.
- Volunteer service may include a wide range of activities that make a positive impact.
- Recipients must attend the annual meeting to accept the award.

Any UIRA member may submit a nomination, including nominating themselves. Please include a one-page letter describing how the nominee has successfully contributed through involvement in one or more activities, and a one-page biography, which includes the nominee's name, mailing address, email address, and phone number. **Nominations are due Monday, April 15, 2024**, to Awards Committee chair **Carolyn Wanat** at <u>carolyn-wanat@uiowa.edu</u>.
