be wondering what books those children might enjoy. Angela Pilkington of the Iowa City Public Library and Molly Roberts of Prairie Lights Books will discuss what's new, what's popular, and what's exciting now in children's literature.

Angela Pilkington has served as the Children's Services coordinator at the Iowa City Public Library since June 2015 and is responsible for the Children's Room, including outreach to schools and daycares in the community. She received a BA in elementary education from North Central College and a PhD in library and information science from the University of Illinois. Molly I. Roberts earned BA degrees in English and journalism from the University of Iowa and has worked as the Prairie Lights children's bookseller since July 2023. A lifelong lover of children's literature, she believes books written for kids can and should be enjoyed by readers of all ages. Her favorite book is *Matilda* by Roald Dahl. She is also a short fiction writer, and her work has appeared in *Jabberwock Review*.

Deaccession and Restitution (Stanley Museum of Art)

Earlier this year, the Stanley Museum of Art became the first museum in North America to return objects in its permanent collection looted by the British from the Benin Kingdom in 1897, directly to the Oba of Benin. The formal restitution took place on July 15, 2024, at the Oba's Palace in Benin City, Nigeria. Museum Director Lauren Lessing and Curator of African

Art Cory Gundlach will discuss the ethical, cultural, and practical considerations involved in this project, and what implications they have for other American museums with collections associated with colonial contexts. Lauren Lessing

Lauren Lessing became the eighth director of the University of Iowa Stanley Museum of Art in July 2018. Over the past year, Lessing has shaped an ambitious vision for the Stanley that includes a new mission to transform lives by connecting the University of Iowa community, Iowans, and the world with extraordinary works of art. A native Midwesterner, Lessing earned a BA in fine art at Earlham College and completed her PhD in art history at Indiana University under the guidance of Sarah Burns.

Cory K. Gundlach joined the University of Iowa Stanley Museum of Art as curator of African art in 2015. Gundlach holds a BA in fine art from

Humboldt State University, a BA in art history from Colorado State University, and a PhD in art history from the University of Iowa. His curatorial work has received support from the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation, which awarded him and the Stanley's director, Dr. Lauren Lessing, \$400,000 in 2023 to oversee provenance research on the African collection for two years. He was appointed director of Iowa's African Studies Program on July 1, 2024.

After the Vets returned, Pine Hill, barracks in rows like corn, After the war, Pine Hill became our home, With old Fords out front Clotheslines strung down the grassy alleys behind, Our common backyard, Our mothers' gossip fence, Our playground, Where G.I. Bill kids played Annie-Annie-Over, And tag, And Hide 'n Seek, Ran dirty and shouting, Shrill voices mixing with radios, And gossip,

After the war, our fathers, no longer soldiers, we came to Pine Hill,

To the barracks where men had trained for war,

To live as families,

And dancing diapers.

To be converted, like the barracks, to a new purpose.

Drawn up like Conestogas,

A palisade of Pines ringing the place where we lived,

Sighing on the edge of our settlement,

The Pines, a gentle fence for our Kinder-Garten.

The Pines marked our demense.

We knew them.

We knew the ultramarine of their shade.

We knew the wind sighing in their topmost branches,

Touching their fingertips to earth.

We knew the smell of fallen needles, the feel,

Making thick carpets for secret rooms.

We knew the Owls,

Their castings of small bones, reconstructed, produced a perfect mouse for science.

We knew the pathways and where they led; Down to the stream and the willows for swinging, Along the crest to Monument Hill with its stele shining, And all the other hills, each uninhabited.



We knew where the Swamp Mallows, Jewel Weed, Poison Ivy, Tiger Lillies grew.

We knew how to catch Crayfish and where to camp in Winter.

We knew unhappy children with strange names who chewed pork chop bones after the meat,

Who cried tears of gratitude for a gift of clothing,

Who spoke little English,

Who had lived in Latvia before,

Before they were displaced,

Before they came to live with us,

Before our fathers had become soldiers

Before the barracks had been converted to a new purpose.

Now on Pine Hill grass covers our foundations, overgrows the road.

The ring of Pines breached by silence.

Black Eyed Susans gambol in the grassy alleys that were our playground.

Wild grapes hang on the Honeysuckle.

We are gone,

The refugees,

The Fords,

The clotheslines,

The gossip,

The G.I. Bill kids,

And our fathers.

On the map there is an empty space where we used to live.

A refugee from another kind of war, you have come to tell me of your loneliness.

You, too, are a refugee bending to a new purpose.

You, too, will leave Pine Hill, hemmed in by Pines, inhabited by grasses,

You too will leave it to the Owls.
