Share Your Knowledge & Experience as a Mentor

Is it just me, or does it seem that time flies faster in retirement than in our former work week? It's hard to believe it is already December.

I recently attended an all-day conference on "Mentoring Students," sponsored by the Division of Student Life and the Office of the Provost. It was an engaging day with a wide variety of topics addressed. There were hundreds of participants, including faculty, staff, and alumni, all committed to the crucial role of guiding students toward personal and professional growth. Because UIRA is a large group of experienced and savvy former employees who bolstered and sustained this educational institution, I wanted to learn how retirees might best contribute to the cause. I was met with enthusiasm for our involvement.

Members of panel discussions spoke candidly about their career paths, highlighting the struggles and mistakes they made along the way, juggling potential job opportunities, and how they faced a new life of employment and responsibility. An overarching suggestion was to convey to the student that they are not alone on their journey.

Presenters encouraged mentors to discuss realistic opportunities for students in their planned career path, and, where appropriate, to broaden their thinking about job possibilities. A starter conversation might include suggesting that students "self-analyze" and ask, "What do you value?" "What kind of work environment would you enjoy?" Some suggestions for stress management are also welcomed.

I believe pursuing this mentoring exchange with students would be a very positive and rewarding experience for retirees. For more information, visit the <u>UI mentoring</u> website. Let me know if interested, and I'll share a list of names with the staff there.

There were some specific opportunities presented to me at the conference, including the "John Deere Scholars High School Program: Unlocking Opportunities" for 20 qualifying high school seniors from Davenport who plan to attend the University of Iowa. They will be selected in January 2025 and the organizer welcomes retiree participation in the mentorship of the students. There will be opportunities when they visit campus, but I do not have any dates yet. Others include a variety of biology topics for undergraduates in laboratories. There's a need to gauge where students are and where they want to go. And, within Political Science, it was encouraged to help identify student interest and diverse pathways for career possibilities.


