
Andy Banse

They Don't Want Her Here: A Conversation with Attorney Carolyn Chalmers and Professor Jean Jew

Professor Jean Jew and attorney and author Carolyn Chalmers will discuss the sexual harassment suit against the UI's College of Medicine that unfolded over eight years (1983-1992), including a university investigation, federal trial, and a state court jury trial. The experience led Chalmers to write a personal memoir, titled *They Don't Want Her Here*. Published by the University of Iowa Press in 2022, it was a finalist for the 2023 Minnesota Book Award.

Carolyn Chalmers' legal career spanned four decades in employment litigation before she turned to writing. In addition, she served as the director of the Office for Conflict Resolution at the University of Minnesota (2000-14). In this role she designed and administered a dispute resolution system for faculty and staff employment disputes. In academic year 2006-07, she also served as the interim director of the university's Office for Equal Opportunity and Affirmative Action. Chalmers has been repeatedly recognized by her peers as among the top alternative dispute resolution practitioners in Minnesota, with her mediation work focused on employment, sexual harassment, and higher education conflicts. She was recognized as one of the top 50 Twin City women attorneys in the decade of the '90s. Chalmers received a JD degree cum laude from the University of Minnesota Law School. She has a BA degree with distinction in English literature from Carleton College, magna cum laude, and a MA degree in anthropology from Brandeis University. She has received distinguished alumni awards from

Carleton College and from the University of Minnesota Law School.

Jean Y. Jew received a medical degree from Tulane University School of Medicine and began her academic career at the University of Iowa College of Medicine in 1973. As a tenured professor, she conducted research on the brain and autonomic nervous system, taught human anatomy, neuroscience, and neurology and served as a leader for gender equity. The Jean Y. Jew Women's Rights Award has been awarded annually since 1992. She was inducted into the Iowa Women's Hall of Fame in 2018. Dr. Jew is an emerita professor at the university.

Emeritus Faculty Council Lecture

From Language History to History As It Happens: A Sociolinguist in the Migration Crisis Mercedes Niño-Murcia

Professor Emerita, Hispanic Linguistics Thursday, April 17, 4:00 p.m. Kollros Auditorium (101 Biology Building East)

From Professor Niño-Murcia: My country of origin, Colombia, puts the normative Spanish language high among symbols of prestige and patriotism. Then in grad school days I studied how Spanish interacted with Quechua, the Inka language, which endures as the low-status language of Andean and west-Amazonian native

peoples. This made me hyper-conscious of how power differentials saturate big and small language differences. My life as an immigrant in the USA made me ever more aware of related frictions along the English-Spanish interface. I turned to studying the big and small ways in which language politics generate and perpetuate North American inequalities. From tiny details of pronunciation up to major policy positions, how we hear, and judge language has everything to do with what kind of country we are in.

Within a minute or two the helicopters appeared and soon King Charles III and



Queen Camilla drove past us mere meters (or yards) from where we stood! I looked at the young man and said, "Well, that just happened!" and we both laughed. It happened so fast I couldn't get my phone ready. You'll have to trust that Charles and Camilla are waving from the backseat.

By this time, I was thoroughly intrigued by all the history happening around me and headed back to Buckingham Palace the next morning. I again found myself next to a street barricade just to get away from the throng of well-wishers, and King Charles drove past me... again!! This time I had my phone ready.

On the third day, I decided to see what was happening around Westminster Abbey. I stopped and asked a police officer



(aka bobby) why there were so many people hanging out in the area. He said that in a few minutes King Charles would be driving past. I joked that I'd already seen him twice in two days, and I wouldn't block someone else getting to see him.

I am so grateful to have experienced this historical event. It's what I was hoping for in my retirement!
