## **Walking Tour of Campus Trees**

Tuesday, May 13, 1:00 p.m., meet on the east side of Macbride Hall (entry to Museum of Natural History). Your UIRA Program Committee host is **Nancy Langguth**, <u>nancylangguth@uiowa.edu</u>.

On the UI campus there are almost 9,000 trees, comprising over 350 species and countless cultivars in maintained areas. Of note are two Conifer Reference Gardens as recognized by the American Conifer Society, a Literary Grove featuring trees with connections to famous authors at the world-famous Writers' Workshop, a Querceretum (oak collection), an extensive



collection of gingkoes, and several current or former Iowa State Champion trees.

Andrew Dahl has been the campus arborist at the University of Iowa for 25 years. In that time, the University has achieved Tree Campus USA designation in the past 16 years and became an Accredited Level II Arboretum through ArbNet in 2021. Andrew became an International Society of Arboriculture certified arborist in 1995. He has been awarded Urban Forestry Professional of the Year by both the Iowa Urban Forestry Council and the International Society of Arboriculture, the Award of Merit by the Midwest Chapter of the International Society of Arboriculture, and Outstanding Advocate by Trees Forever.

When Andrew isn't busy working at the University arboretum, he's serving on several local and regional tree committees, looking for neat trees to visit, seeds to start, and people to talk trees with.



# Reflections

One of the many joys of my career at the University of Iowa was directing the Obermann Center for Advanced Studies. I followed in the footsteps of the inimitable Jay Semel, who decided to retire when the version of the center he directed blew up—quite literally—with the leveling of Oakdale Hall. I was thrilled to be selected as his successor, only to find myself the director of nothing and nowhere. My first assignment, therefore, was to work with UI Facilities staff to identify a new location.

Thus was I introduced to the deep, dark, mysterious Mission Impossible process of campus space planning. Every other day, my phone would ring, and a stern voice would say, "Meet me at the corner of X and Y. Do not bring anyone with you. Do not tell anyone where you're going."



After several such surreptitious encounters, I was introduced to the lovely Tudor house at 111 Church Street, in the posh neighborhood of the President's House and the centers of creative writing at the University.

It appeared, however, that we had stumbled into Mission Impossible, The Sequel. The kitchen was a mountain of pizza boxes and chicken bones. A resident writing fellow, desperate to finish writing a novel, barricaded herself in her room. Water was rising in a flooding basement. Wide-eyed, I was edging out the door when Cheryl Reardon (then a member of the Office of the Vice President for Research) said "Give me two weeks." In her usual unflappable, steely fashion, Cheryl cleared the house, cleaned the basement, and found a budget for renovations and refurnishing.

A few months later, Neda Barrett (then Director of Operations at Obermann and now CLAS Senior Human Resources Director) and I were settling into what has become one of the most beloved spaces on campus. Over the years, I had the incredible pleasure of working with a team that in addition to Neda included Jennifer New, Saffron Henke, Erin Hackathorn, Jenna Hammerich, Lauren Cox, and brilliant graduate assistants and postdocs.

The latest incarnation of the Obermann Center is an inspiring example of the power of invention, collaboration, creativity, and generosity when the faculty, staff, and students who come together to form the University work together in support of research and teaching, discovery, and learning. Not only did the Obermann Center prove to be Mission Possible. Under the excellent leadership of the new director, Luis Martín-Estudillo, the Center continues to flourish and to ensure the research of faculty and students will be possible far into the future.

## **UIRA Volunteer Service Awards Announced**

The UIRA annually honors two of its members for their volunteer service to the community and to the University of Iowa. To be eligible, nominees should be members of the UIRA, retired for at least two years, have outstanding service carried out since retirement (activities prior to retirement do not count), and have engaged in activities that have made a positive impact. The UIRA Awards Committee receives nominations for the awards in April and announces the recipients in May.

For 2025, the UIRA Community Service Award goes to **Sue Otto** and the University of Iowa Service Award is awarded to **Carolyn Wanat**. They will be honored at the UIRA Annual Meeting, June 27.

### Service to the Community Award

**Sue Otto** is a former president of UIRA (2018-2019) and member of several committees including Nominating and Programs. She had a special skill in creating Qualtrics surveys for elections and member surveys.

Her community activities are many and varied. For the past eight years, she has served as secretary to the Mayfield Homeowners Association board, which serves 168 residential units, providing dues and special assessments, insurance, landscaping care, snow removal, garbage removal and recycling, and other community expenses.

Sue also has been very active in the Unitarian Universalist Society, serving on its board as president (2011-2012). Sue also served on its New Facilities Committee and various subcommittees in addition to being a worship associate for 10 years. Service trips to the Texas/Mexico border in

Mexicali and Matamoros were especially memorable while distributing supplies to asylum-seekers. Other local UU committee involvements include Leadership Development, Ministerial Fellowship, Hospitality (team leader), and Board of Trustees.

In recent years Sue has been a volunteer/teacher for the Friendship Community Project where she served as a native-speaker volunteer for a weekly ESL conversation group. Since 2024 Sue has been an assistant and teacher for the beginning literacy classes and the beginning level ESL classes for immigrants.

A very special involvement is being a member of a support team for a Cuban immigrant couple. This team has helped the couple find lodging and discusses the couple's schedule, finances, needs, and issues. In addition, Sue provides Spanish interpretation services and participates in filling out myriad legal paperwork for both state and federal agencies including green card applications.

In addition to her community service activities, Sue enjoys traveling, taking classes, attending lectures and workshops, reading, exercising, and spending time with friends and neighbors.

Sue retired from the University of Iowa in 2015 as associate professor emerita in the Division of World Languages, Literatures, and Cultures. She was director of the UI Language Media Center and co-director of the FLARE Second Language Acquisition doctoral program. For 35 years she focused on creating foreign language instructional software and researching the effects of multimedia and web/based applications on language acquisition and cross-cultural understanding.

- Serving a three-year term on the Senior College Committee (2018-2021), where duties included proposing new courses and coordinating and co-coordinating courses. This included a new course offered by Professor Ed Kottick on the harpsichord. Professor Kottick has since taught a course each year on a wide array of music topics.
- Course delivery moved from in-person to Zoom during the pandemic. Carolyn and her colleagues shared responsibilities for setting up and navigating Zoom delivery.

- During her year as past-president and program chair, the membership began hosting outdoor hikes (to safely host in-person events). The Explorers Special Interest Group continues, and Carolyn is an active participant.
- Carolyn continues to serve as proofreader for *The Gray Hawk*

#### Service to the University (in an informal capacity)

- Post-retirement, at the request of the associate dean, Carolyn has continued to serve as an informal mentor to assistant and associate professors in the College of Education.
- She continues to mentor former students who are now tenured professors at Iowa and other universities. She has encouraged and assisted them in seeking academic positions and has advised on research, teaching, and service.

In addition to her service to the university, Carolyn is also active in the Iowa City community, including membership in Iowa City AM Rotary. While a Rotary member, Carolyn served as mentor to City High Interact members. Interact is the high school Rotary-sponsored service club. She also is an usher for Iowa City Community Theater, City Circle Acting Company, and the Coralville Center for the Performing Arts.

Carolyn retired in 2013 as associate professor emerita from the Department of Educational Policy and Leadership Studies. She served as program chair of the Educational Leadership Program that prepared students to serve as school principals, superintendents, and other leadership positions. For nearly 25 years, she offered a popular qualitative field methods research course that attracted students from the College of Education and other colleges.
